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

ISST VICE-PRESIDENT EUROPE/AFRICA/MIDDLE EAST



In the beginning... Reyhana remembers

In 1986 I emigrated with my four children to Canada for political reasons. I held a Med.Sc Master's Degree in Social Work and had done a lot of training in South Africa with Stanton Andoplhi. I believed I knew how to work with families and children.

To my surprise, I learned that I had no training in play therapy or any training in working with children through my 7 years at university. I attended my first play therapy training and thereafter received a scholarship to study further in this field at the University of North Texas with Dr Garry Landreth.

This was a life changing experience. Not only did I learn how to provide therapy for children through play and sand play therapy, but also how to apply different types of interventions with different types of children.

On my returned to South Africa in 1993, I was a fully certified Play Therapist and Trainer. I started offering workshops in South Africa.

I also brought many international trainers in Play Therapy to South Africa. One of them was Lois Carey, a play therapist who trained with Dora Kalff, and she presented amazing workshops in Johannesburg and Cape Town.

It was at one of my workshops that I met my soulmatefriend Braam Beetge. He attended the same workshop



3 times, and I was curious about this. When I asked him why, he replied: "I knew I was looking for something. I found it here. I need to become a play therapist and learn about Sandplay Therapy".

I continued to attend the Association for Play Therapists in the USA regularly. Fascinated by sandplay therapy and eager to learn more about it, both Braam and I were interested in becoming Sandplay Therapists.

When I attended the ATP conference in Chicago, I met several people who were certified as Sandplay Therapists. I also heard about a residential training in Sandplay Therapy. I called Braam in South Africa to tell him about the training in Switzerland. We took a deep breathe about the cost. We desperately wanted to attend it, but we could not afford it. I approached the organizer to ask if we could pay in installments – what a moment....

So off we went to Switzerland for a phenomenal 2 ½ weeks of training. We ate bread, cheese, more bread, leaves! We simply had no money for food, only for miniatures!

While in Switzerland, we convinced Martin Kalff and his wife Sabine to come to South Africa to present training in sandplay and soul painting.

What a great success that was! Afterwards Braam and I started a training programme, inviting international trainers in Sandplay Therapy to provide theoretical training locally.

We initiated the first two-year intensive ISST certified training in South Africa and were very fortunate to have excellent trainers — Deborah Bedford-Strohm, Ruth Amman, Judy Zappacosta and Martin Kalff. Braam and I both worked towards certification and attended the ISST conference in Venice. Eventually, we both qualified as ISST therapists. We also met Imme Thom, who was a great asset for sandplay in South Africa.

Our journey was by no means easy. But it was amazing. Thank you to everyone who made it possible.







The Symbol Shack

The Black Madonna

The Black Madonna emerged as an archetypal figure with deep significance for many Sandplay therapists who studied with Dora Kalff. In the Intensive Sandplay Program in Switzerland organized over the years by Patty Flowers, first with Frau Kalff and then with Martin Kalff and Judy Zappacosta, it was tradition for the international Sandplay study group to visit Einsiedeln and the Einsiedeln Abby in Switzerland to experience the Black Madonna who is known to bring healing and justice for all those in need.


She represents for many the feminine side of God – a dark, unconscious mysterious and unpredictable side of the godhead (Zappacosta, 2016).

The Black Madonna was very much alive for me in my own inner world as I studied Sandplay Therapy and completed a circle, first as student in Switzerland and then being invited to teach Sandplay Therapy in the Sandplay Intensive programme in Switzerland. Compassionately, she helped me to grow in a more spiritual direction, celebrating the union of masculine and feminine aspects of my spiritual path.

Dora Kalff had a dream in which she asked Franz Jung, architect son of CG Jung, to help her find a house in Zurich to live in when she came from Parpan. The house, she said to Franz in her dream, must have a Madonna. As her life destiny worked out, she found her house, an old farmhouse that was built in 1485 in Hinder Zeunen, Zollikon. "I stood in front of the house, and I thought, that's the house. I couldn't see it yet, because the owner was away, but I knew it was the house. I saw rows of windows...with grapevines growing just outside of them and the Madonna! There is a Madonna inset into the front wall" (Kornfield, 2006, p 85).

In her living room Dora also had a wooden Madonna statue that she and her son Peter found and bought at a tea shop. It is still very much present today in the living room where Dora put it. For her it was important to bring in the energy of the Black Madonna into her Sandplay therapy room and to become part of the Temenos.

The Black Madonna's history is traced back in time to many goddesses, including Ishtar and Isis. In older civilisations, a goddess mother was documented as creator.

When the Greeks worshipped her, they called her Artemis. The Black Madonna is also traced as the Mother Mary. In the East, one of the most striking counterparts of the dark goddess is Kali in India - the goddess of destruction and creation. Both the Black Madonna and Kali are associated with sacrifice. (Zappacosta, 2016).

The author Fred Gustafson (1990) referred to the Black Madonna as holding both religious and psychological importance and that these Black Madonna figures speak to that very deprived area of the soul, which hungers for value and hope amid that which cannot be defined and is incomprehensible in life.

In Sandplay Therapy she appears in a variety of ways offering symbolic representation of birth, death and regeneration.

For Dora Kalff she was the first image of femininity for a woman with her compassion, devotion and surrender. On her blackness, Kalff said "...I think it became dark, maybe through the candles that were burning in front of

her all the time. That could be one version. But when the Black Madonna appears, you know, let's say in my work with patients, I would usually be able to see it as the first impulse of the good feminine. It is still dark; it is not yet visible and open. It has to develop" (Kornfield, 2006).

Marion Woodman, a Jungian Analyst, (in Zappacosta, 2016) says about the Black Madonna: "She is a shadow side, shadow in the sense that she is not fully known, and thereafter, black. She is Mother, but she is also human, with an earthiness in her. In the past, the Black Madonna was worshipped for her fecundity, for her luscious giving to the earth - the bounty of the harvest, the bounty of the flowers, and the bounty of the evergreens...We as peoples of the world seem starved for her presence. She is emerging in feminine character, determined to save the planet because of her profound relationship to nature."
